Minutes of the meeting of the Parish Council held on Wednesday 13<sup>th</sup> November 2019 at Doug's Shed Splatthayes

### **1. Apologies**

No apologies had been received.

### **2. Signing of the Minutes of the Meeting Held 18<sup>th</sup> September 2019**

It was agreed that the Clerk would write to Councillor Twiss setting out the reasons for wanting this change. Phil would then take this proposal to HATOC (Highways and Traffic Orders Committee) on receipt of the letter from the Parish Council.

### Broadband

A public consultation that is due to run until the 10<sup>th</sup> of December following what is termed an Open Market Review (OMR) that took place in the summer, following the cancellation of the contract between Connecting Devon and Somerset (CDS) and Gigaclear, due to a number of performance and other issues.

CDS, which is responsible for rolling out publicly-funded broadband across the two counties, is establishing the remaining area where there are no current or credible future plans to deliver Next Generation Access (NGA) broadband infrastructure capable of download speeds of at least 30Mbps.

Nearly one million homes and businesses in Devon and Somerset now have access to superfast broadband thanks to the Government supported CDS programme and stimulation of the commercial market which is an important element of CDS's role. Of these, over 300,000 homes and businesses have access to superfast broadband as a direct result of investment by CDS.

A new company called Jurassic fibre [www https://jurassic-fibre.com/](https://jurassic-fibre.com/) now have an operations base established on Heathpark and will be working up the A30 towards Dorset and South Somerset after completing their first phase delivery, where I have been told that their Ultrafast Broadband fibre offer (speeds over 100Mbps) will include Honiton and surrounding settlements, but I can't see this being for at least 18 months, probably longer.

### DCC Highways

We are fast approaching budget time and I will be meeting my Neighbourhood Highways Officer in the next couple of weeks to agree work in the Feniton & Honiton Division, where clearly there are a number of remedial work that needs to be undertaken in the parish!

### Project Funding

We are all asked at some time or another about funding of projects and the Devon County Council Economy Team publishes a regular update of opportunities for a diverse range of interests and it is worthwhile signing up to it at <https://www.devon.gov.uk/fundingnews/>

A couple of current opportunities published recently that might apply locally are the **Condition Improvement Fund** which provides Capital funding for academies, sixth-form colleges and non-diocesan VA schools to improve the condition of school buildings, including health & safety issues and building compliance and the **Rural Development Programme for England: Growth Programme** which provides Funding for small rural businesses for capital investment in food processing, rural tourism infrastructure and business development. Most of East Devon outside of Exmouth and Sidmouth is classified as rural.

Dave asked about the drain outside Mandolin Winds and Phil stated that this **PT** would be pursued at his next meeting with Mike Brown (Highways).

## **9. Councillor Susie Bond – Report**

Given the reduction in central Government funding, EDDC is looking at ways of bridging the gap in our finances to avoid cutting discretionary services. One of these initiatives was a review of EDDC car park charges, which have remained the same since 2010. A report to Cabinet recommending we go out to public consultation with a proposal to increase charges by 20% increase (from £1/hour to £1.20/hour) in our most popular car parks, resulted in a storm of protest from district councillors. The decision has been called in and a TAFF will be established to look at our car parking strategy in its entirety.

The new Council Plan is going through the committees and we hope it will be adopted at the December full Council meeting. This sets out the Council's priorities for the next four years, with a strong emphasis on the climate change agenda.

The work being undertaken on the Greater Exeter Strategic Plan was put on hold after the May election to gauge the appetite of five councils (East Devon, Mid-Devon, Teignbridge, Exeter City and Devon County) to continue with the process, given the changed political make-up of all the councils. It has now been agreed to continue with formulation of the Plan which will seek to address housing provision (through allocation of sites) up to 2040.

On a lighter note, if residents have an Alexa, they can now ask EDDC a question, starting with the phrase, "Alexa, ask East Devon District Council ..." followed by (for example) "when are my bins collected?". Equally, for users of a Smart phone, the EDDC App provides similar information.

Chris asked whether the Parkmobile app for EDDC car parks offered the £2

winter parking option. Susie will find out about this.

## **11. Roads Report**

- a) Road flooding along the road from Westcroft – despite a search of the Land Registry details it had still not proved possible to ascertain ownership. It seems clear that whoever owns the field needs to create a ditch on the inside of the hedge to prevent water running off the field and across the road.
  
- b) Ditches near Summerhayes – Geoff will draw up a plan which the Clerk can then use to obtain some options from Devon Highways for clearing the ditches. Options are either a concrete gully or to dredge the ditch with possible damage to the cable left behind by Gigaclear. It was agreed that the Parish Council would be prepared to consider part funding any necessary works.
  
- c) The drain in the road opposite Broadlands is still broken. Clare will report this again.
