

NEWS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL

Volunteer Emergency Telephone System (VETS)

As you are probably aware the Parish Council is looking into the feasibility of introducing a VETS scheme in the Parish of Buckerell. The idea is that in a medical emergency to offer support to lone rescuers and those living in more isolated areas by collecting the defibrillator from the north gate of the church and assisting as needed. The telephone system is run and maintained by the Community Heartbeat Trust. The response from the village so far has been positive but we would like three or four more to join the team. You don't have to have any medical training or be available at all times and you will be well supported.

Village Speed Limits

The Parish Council have written to Councillor Twiss requesting that Highways and Traffic Orders Committee review the speed limits in the village. The proposal is that the 30mph limit should be extended north east from Sunningdale on the road to Hembury Fort to past Hillside. In addition we have asked that a 20mph limit should be considered in the centre of the village.
