### **1. Apologies**

No apologies had been received.

### **2. Agreeing the Minutes of the Meeting Held 18<sup>th</sup> January 2023**

The minutes of the meeting held on Wednesday 18<sup>th</sup> January 2023 were agreed as a correct record of that meeting.

### **3. Matters arising (not on agenda)**

- a) Clare noted that she had been invited to a presentation by the new owners of Hembury Hill Fort, Historic England, on Friday 17<sup>th</sup> March.
- b) A letter had been received from TRIP requesting a donation. This has been deferred to the May meeting for a decision. IT
- c) The request for a grit bin at the foot of the hill by Avenhayes was made on the DCC interactive map after the last meeting. No response received as yet. IT
- d) The plaque for the commemorative oak in the churchyard has been received and put in place.
- e) Following a request, Peter Gent had been asked to delay strimming the roadside verge adjacent to Cabbage Lane until later in the year to protect the daffodils.
- f) The wall between the Old Rectory and the Church needs repair, and to ensure safety the Parish Council bench will be moved into the IT

churchyard.

- g) The Clerk has spoken with the BCA treasurer about reinstating Parish Council contributions towards production costs which stopped during the pandemic. The conversation is on-going at present. IT
- h) Some concerns had been raised by villagers about the noise of cars being tuned on a rolling road in a unit along Curscombe Lane. It was agreed that an email should go out to the village with detail of who to contact at EDDC when noise in the village is an issue. IT

#### **7. Councillor Philip Twiss – Report**

##### **SEND and AP**

H M Government published its SEND (Special educational needs and

disabilities) and AP (alternative Provision) improvement plan last week, confirming extra investment in training for teachers, and additional specialist school places for those with greatest needs. Thirty three new special free schools (are to be built under the new plan, including one in East Devon, provisionally located in or close to Cranbrook. A further 49 special free schools across the country are already in the pipeline. Free schools are funded by the government but are not run by the local authority. They have more control over how they do things. They're 'all-ability' schools, so cannot use academic selection processes like a grammar school. There will also be expanded training for staff, ranging from up to 5,000 early years special educational needs co-ordinators, to 400 educational psychologists, covering a range of educational needs. This is welcome news as Devon has seen a surge in demand for SEND and AP places, and despite a very large chunk of the total Devon CC budget going on Children's and Adults services (around 80% of the total) it is still not enough, where the SEND budget for 2022/23 will finish up approximately £40m over spent. We continue to be in discussion with the Department for Education on further support from them via a mechanism called the education 'safety valve', as this position is clearly not sustainable in the longer term.

### **30 mph signs update**

Having gone through the laborious process and hoop jumping concerning extending the 30mph road signs from edge of the village towards Hembury Fort, I can finally see daylight at the end of the tunnel. They will be relocated to close to the old village hall as we have discussed on many occasions. I have 'ring fenced' £2000 from my DCC Locality Budget to pay for the work, which is briefly described in the extract of an E Mail between me and Chris Rook, the relevant officer at DCC Highways. I made the point to him that it's not the volume of cars that particularly matters; it only takes one vehicle travelling at excess speed to do damage and harm!' The scheme is now programmed for the coming financial year and the team are completing a locality budget form for 23/24 to secure funds to proceed. Best regards, Chris Holiday

### **Activities and Food Programme 2023 - update**

The funding round for the Holiday Activities and Food Programme for 203 is nearing completion where DCC will have 62 Providers delivering holiday activities and food across Devon for our benefit related Free School Meal children. A range of activities will be available for Primary and Secondary age ranges. As in previous years the relevant information on the providers will be published on the DCC web site, although it's not live just yet, but

should be imminently. The offer is 4 days at Easter, 16 days in the summer and 4 days at Christmas. A day is defined as 4 hours, including a nutritious meal. There is a change this year in that DCC is introducing a code for parents to be able to book a place. We will be writing to each parent with a unique coded which they will need to share with the HAF provider to book a place. This is a requirement for the Department for Education and we will asking local schools to let parents know that the HAF site is live. It isn't possible to have the scheme in every school but DCC are trying to offer a spread across the County. Places are fully funded and there is an 'extended criteria for those children who fall outside of Benefit related free school meals who would like to participate. ## **Food waste**

Shockingly too much food is still needlessly going to waste. New figures reveal that over over a quarter of what we put in our 'black bin' waste in Devon is food, much of it is in its original packaging, unopened. The new figures follow a study of the contents of our black rubbish bins and coincide with the recent Food Waste Action Week 2023, which took place from the 6th to 13th of March. Although we have a food waste collection, around 28 per cent of the contents of our 'black bin' is food, which is such a waste of food and money. This amounts annually to 37,000 tonnes of food across Devon. Most of this food could have been eaten with a bit of planning and by taking some simple steps. In Devon an astonishing 79 per cent of food waste is avoidable while 44 per cent was still in its packaging. The study also found large amounts of plastic and paper were being put into black bins, despite that 41 per cent of it in Devon could have been recycled if it had been put into the correct kerbside collection bin. Food Action Week encouraged people to make some simple changes which could save them time and money. Through their "Win. Don't Bin" campaign 'WRAP' <https://wrap.org.uk/about-us> is offering handy tips and recipe ideas, including checking the fridge before shopping, keeping track of fridge contents, using food before it reaches the use by date, using leftovers, checking the fridge temperature and making a weekly meal plan. In support of this, through the Devon Authorities Strategic Waste Committee (DASWC), Devon County council is working with Torbay Council and our district partners to deliver a range of initiatives to reduce food waste and ensure any wasted food is put it in the right bin for collection.

## **8. Councillor Alasdair Bruce – Report**

Alasdair reported on his communications with the Planning Team at EDDC. He also reported that the Strategic Plan is being restarted over what was seen as a flawed consultation exercise. He pointed out that developers still see Feniton as a prime site, and the negative impact this would have on neighbouring communities such as Buckerell in terms of traffic volume.
